PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear NCJW Members and Friends,



Since my last President's message much has transpired in our organization, nationally, in Israel and here at home. NCJW is busy with social justice issues and I'd like to relate to you some of the work we've accomplished and some of the experiences we've had.

On December 9th NCJW was represented at the White House Hanukkah party by National President Nancy Ratzan, Director of Washington Operations Sammie Moshenberg, National Vice President and Incoming President Linda Slucker along with soon to be CEO

Nancy K. Kaufman. They were greeted by White House staff who said, "Welcome – this is your house." They chatted and posed for pictures with Vice President Biden, Senators, and Supreme Court Justices but the highlight was meeting President and Mrs. Obama, and being able to thank them personally for their work on behalf of women, children, and families. The lighting of the menorah was particularly memorable as it was a special one, retrieved from the muck of Katrina. Linda Slucker reported the following: "The spirit of the season, the welcoming atmosphere, the unpretentious hospitality in the midst of splendor made the event unforgettable." The invitation to this party was an acknowledgement of NCJW's key role in our movement for social justice.

Another invitation was extended to NCJW on what turned out to be a sunny day in Washington, both literally and figuratively. We were witness to the bill signing of the repeal of the policy "Don't Ask, Don't Tell." This policy of denying lesbian and gay individuals the ability to serve openly in the United States armed forces was worked on for many years by NCJW and thus we were extended this invitation. President Obama entered the room to find an excited and energetic audience, including NCJW's senior legislative associate Elissa Froman. The President told those gathered for this emotional event; "Our people sacrifice a lot for their country, including their lives. None of them should have to sacrifice their integrity as well." He ended his speech with; "I want to speak directly to the gay men and women currently serving in our military. For a long time your service has demanded a particular kind of sacrifice. You've been asked to carry the added burden of secrecy and isolation. And all the while, you've put your lives on the line for the freedoms and privileges of citizenship that are not fully granted to you...And so, as the first generation to serve openly in our Armed Forces, you will stand for all those who came before you, and you will serve as role models to all who come after. And I know that you will fulfill this responsibility with integrity and honor, just as you have every other mission with which you've been charged." Elissa was honored to meet some of the soldiers who were dismissed from the military after coming out. There is work to be done to help others still facing discrimination and NCJW continues to engage in the fight for the full emancipation of every lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individual.

Sammie Moshenberg, Director of Washington Operations was a participant in what she called "the most festive day of the congressional calendar," Swearing-in-Day. Representing NCJW, she watched as legislators from around the country took their oath for a new two-year congressional session. Swearing-in-Day gives the NCJW Washington office staff the opportunity to meet new members of Congress and their staffs, educate them about NCJW and our agenda, and persuade them to join us in our causes. Making this happen relies a great deal on hearing from constituents, so continue to make your voices heard about the issues and remember to sign up with the Action Center by logging on to www.ncjw.org.

On January 13, 2011 we welcomed our first CEO to the National Council of Jewish Women. Nancy K. Kaufman comes to NCJW with an extensive background in advocacy and social services in both the nonprofit and state government arenas. NCJW President Nancy Ratzan stated; "With Nancy Kaufman, a tenacious and accomplished visionary and organizer, as our first CEO, I am confident that we will strengthen and expand NCJW's impact as the most impactful place for Jewish women to build and leave a legacy of social justice." We are all looking forward to the growth and expansion of NCJW with our new leadership.

For over 60 years NCJW has been active in Israel. Our work in Israel directly mirrors the organization's efforts to create progressive social change in the United States. NCJW's pioneering Israel programs foster and support education, promote the empowerment of women, and bridge the gaps in society for Israel's vulnerable women, children, and families. In her most recent NCJW Israel Program Report, Shari Eshet, Director of the NCJW Israel Office writes about the conviction of former president of Israel, Moshe Katzav on the charges of rape and sexual harassment. Shari states; "In order for the system to work, it needs a grassroots base that is willing to speak out. Women's organizations in particular have been the major force behind the campaigns to say no to sexual violence, no to gender segregation, and yes to equality and respect. The bravery of these women and the support of women's organizations have made it possible." NCJW is proud to be one of those organizations that educates and stands up for the rights of women to make our voices heard. An example of this is highlighted in the following statement issued by Nancy Ratzan and Nancy Kaufman on the 38th anniversary of Roe v Wade; "Pro-choice advocates have known for decades now that the victory of Roe v. Wade requires constant defense and vigilance. NCJW has not wavered in that effort or in our insistence that the right to choose is an important expression of religious liberty, allowing women to make reproductive choices based on their own moral and religious beliefs. We will continue to do everything in our power to maintain this key constitutional right so vital to women's equality and moral autonomy." Shari reports that justice did prevail and Katzav was disgraced and punished. To further explain the importance of educating and taking action Shari writes about attending a gender segregation discussion organized by the NCJW Women Studies Forum. She says; "By protesting gender discrimination, we help strengthen Israeli civil society, which in turn strengthens Israel as a whole." NCJW Peninsula Section continues to partner with programs in Israel to help make this happen.

By the time you read this, our Peninsula Section delegation will likely be in Dallas at the 45th National Convention. It is here that we will help set the course for building our future. We are sure to be inspired by our new CEO Nancy Kaufman, educated by the many guest speakers and strengthened by powerful action and progressive change! We will elect new national leaders who will move us forward, approve changes to NCJW bylaws and resolutions, and network with our "sisters" from across the country. Upon our return we will let you all know what we accomplished and experienced.

Is it possible that spring is around the corner after this cold, harsh, snowy winter? With the coming of spring we bring you a host of NCJW programs and events. Look for information in this bulletin and in your directory. Upcoming is the March Program meeting, our Joint Women's Seder, Bingo Night, the Health Forum and much more.

Come experience, learn and see how together, in NCJW, we can make progressive changes.

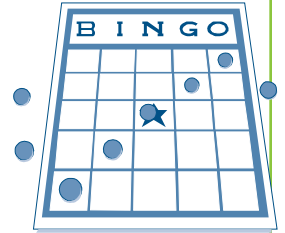

Immigration and Jews

The fourth speaker of our Program series, Gideon Aronoff, President and CEO of HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society) will address us on “Five Reasons Why Jews Should Care about Immigration in 2011” and will bring an update on legislative reform. HIAS is one of 10 national agencies – and the only Jewish organization – that contracts with the State Department to assist refugees coming to the U.S. Founded in 1881, it has helped over 4.5 million people to find refuge in safe havens. HIAS most likely helped your grandparents or great grandparents. Historians have estimated that one of every two Americans can trace his or her roots back to an immigrant who landed at Ellis Island. In addition to aiding Jews who are in need around the world, (there are still an estimated 20,000 Jews in Iran,) it also assists men, women and children of all faiths and backgrounds from dozens of countries. Don’t miss the opportunity to learn about the inspiring work of HIAS.

Working hand in hand with HIAS, the New York section of the National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) was founded in 1893 out of concern for the hundreds of thousands of single and unaccompanied young Jewish women who came through Ellis Island. It was feared that these young women might be “misled into immoral lives, and other girls would be subjected to great dangers because of the lack of some directing and protecting agency at Ellis Island.” In 1910 alone, NCJW dealt with over 60,000 women and children.

Freedom Riders of 2011

A major victory for women’s rights was won on January 6, 2011, when the Israeli High Court declared that segregation on public transportation is illegal. Relying on court decisions and legislation, Supreme Court Justice Elyakim Rubinstein expressed surprise that in the year 2011 the court even needed to state the obvious: Women are entitled to sit wherever they choose on public buses.

Reviewing the history of of bus transporation, he reminded us that there had never been segregation on public buses, and that the issue of segregated seating was raised only in the past decade by a group of religious extremists. They demanded that women sit in the back of public buses on certain routes that traveled through Haredi neighborhoods. They also demanded that women be dressed in a modest fashion, as determined by their “modesty patrols.”

The Egged Bus Company complied with these demands and women were directed to the rear of certain buses, while the front was reserved for men. When some women refused to sit in the back, they were subjected to verbal abuse and occasional physical abuse by some male extremists.

A few women were not permitted to board these buses because of their choice of clothing. When best-selling Orthodox writer Naomi Ragen was subjected to severe harassment while riding a bus to her Jerusalem home, she decided to take action. In 2007, she filed a petition to the High Court of Justice, claiming that she was being denied the right to sit in the front section of a public bus.

Joined by other female victims of harassment on buses, as well as by the Center for Religious Pluralism, they were hopeful when the court ordered the Minister of Transportation to set up a commission to study the issue, conduct hearings, and publish its findings. The commission presented its report in late 2009, declaring that segregated buses were illegal.

Recognizing that some religiously observant men (and women) might wish to sit separately on public buses because of concerns for modesty, the court stated that in a pluralistic, multicultural society, everyone should have the right to sit wherever he or she chooses. However, the court made it very clear that women have the right to sit at the front of the bus (or anywhere else on it) without harassment of any sort, whether verbal or physical. Those who interfere with that right would be subject to criminal prosecution.

Justice Rubinstein, an Orthodox Jew, quoted liberally from Jewish law sources in his opinion, noting that respecting human dignity and love of all humankind were basic to Judaism.

A WOMAN’S RIGHT TO CHOOSE: UNDER ATTACK

National Council of Jewish Women (NCJW) stands firm in its commitment to preserve women’s access to abortion rights. This constitutional right to access a safe and legal abortion was recently marked by the January 22, 2011 anniversary of the historic Roe vs. Wade decision.

These rights are under attack as never before. In this past year alone, 16 states enacted 34 anti-choice measures, increasing the number of such measures enacted since 1995 to 644. In Congress, anti-choice representatives plan to introduce sweeping, draconian anti-abortion legislation that would decimate the constitutional right affirmed by Roe. Chris Smith’s (R-NJ) recent introduced legislation (misleadingly named “No Taxpayer Funding for Abortion Act”) to deny insurance coverage for abortion from millions of women and Rep. Mike Pence’s (R-IN) pledge to defund Planned Parenthood health centers are just two examples of such attacks.

What you can do to take action today:

1) Speak out today and tell Congress to oppose extreme restrictions on abortion care. Go to www.ncjw.org to learn more about the issue and find out how to make your voice heard.

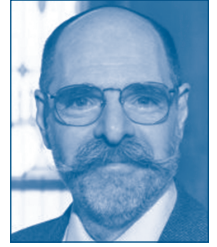
